# Over 18,000 acres selected by Forest Service for preservation as part of Forest Legacy Program



The US Forest Service will invest \$14.4 million to preserve 18,648 acres of private forested lands in Utah as a part of the Forest Legacy Program. Funding for the projects comes from the Inflation Reduction Act, and the investment will ensure these

forestlands will continue to benefit the public and surrounding communities.

Each project site is in an area considered highly developable, and this investment will keep these private lands as working forests that protect water resources for downstream users and provide critical wildlife habitat.

The park hosted a ceremony earlier this month where a professional archer used his bow and arrow to 'cut' a ribbon on the 70-yard lane, signifying its grand opening.


