Work Plan for the Great Salt Lake Basin Integrated Plan now complete



The Utah Division of Water Resources and the Bureau of Reclamation are pleased to announce the finalization of the Work Plan for the Great Salt Lake Basin Integrated Plan (GSLBIP), which charts the course for developing the GSLBIP.

After a 65-day comment period, the initial draft Work Plan was updated in response to recommendations and to include the specific actions necessary for completing the GSLBIP. The GSLBIP is funded with \$5 million by the Utah Legislature in 2022 (HB429) and \$3.1 million from Reclamation's basin study program.

OED launches program to expand EV access across the state



The Utah Office of Energy Development recently launched REVI, the Rural EV Infrastructure program. REVI will expand the state's EV infrastructure, supporting rural communities and visitors alike. The

program is open to all nine members of the Utah Rural Electric Cooperative Association (URECA) and offers two tracks: one to upgrade or expand existing EV infrastructure and another to install new infrastructure. Applications close June 1, 2024.

Guess the Great Salt Lake's rise? The state of Utah will give you a prize



Underground Injection Control Class VI primacy update



In 2022, the Utah Legislature passed House Bill 244, creating a framework for the Utah Division of Oil, Gas, and Mining (OGM) to begin obtaining primacy, or primary enforcement responsibilities, from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to establish an Underground Injection Control (UIC) program.

Primacy would give OGM regulatory oversight of the permitting, construction, operation, compliance and closure of class VI carbon sequestration wells on all lands except tribal, which the EPA currently regulates.

Record 1,779 big game animals assessed, GPS collared during winter captures



Each year, the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources captures big game animals to perform important health assessments and to place GPS collars on the animals to learn more about their migration patterns and survival rates. This winter, a record 1,779 big game animals were captured, providing important data about big game herds across the state.
